CO's Message:

Family and Friends –

Hello again from Al Asad, Iraq. By the time this edition of the Raider Report reaches you, the battalion will be in the process of retrograding the battalion back to Camp Pendleton. It is our hope to soon have the entire battalion back very soon. The security situation here in Iraq has continued to improve each month we have been in country. Of course, there are still a few hot spots around the

country, mostly in the north, but thanks to the efforts of men like your Marines and Sailors, the rampant violence of years past is no more.

The major focus for the battalion since my last update has been preparing “close the door” on the reconnaissance battalion presence in Operation Iraqi Freedom. Since the initial invasion of Iraq in 2003 to today, the three active duty reconnaissance battalions have been rotating in and out of Iraq on seven month tours. Due to the drop in violence, and a general downsizing of Marine forces in Iraq, we will be the last full reconnaissance battalion to deploy to Iraq. Future rotations will consist of much smaller recon elements in support of the Marine forces still in country. To that end, the men of the battalion have

been working extremely hard to turn in the massive amounts of equipment, MRAPs, HMMWVs, weapons, radios, and other supply items that accumulated over six years of reconnaissance battalion deployments. It is no small task, and they are doing it with great care and attention to detail.

Concurrently, the battalion has continued to train aboard Al Asad, conducting daily martial arts classes, and other reconnaissance skill sets such as communications, supporting arms, and physical training.

Back in Camp Pendleton, the men of Alpha Company and the Force Reconnaissance Company have been heavily engaged with training in support of I MEF and Marine Expeditionary Units. Operating autonomously away from the battalion, these platoons continue to do great things in support of I MEF and 1st Marine Division, and advance the reputation of the battalion as men who “stand tall above the competition” as it says in the Reconnaissance Creed.

As always, you can be extremely proud of your Marines and Sailors. Since 2003, this battalion has served a total of 36 months in Iraq. Although this will be the final of five combat deployments to Iraq for the battalion since 2003, the battalion will soon begin to train again for any future fight to which we may be committed. Rest assured, they will always be ready to answer the call. They are quiet

professionals in every sense of the word, and it is our privilege to serve you and our great nation.

As always your continued support is a source of unending strength, for which all of us are eternally grateful.

Due to their efforts, it was a seamless transition.
